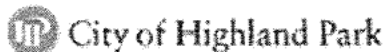

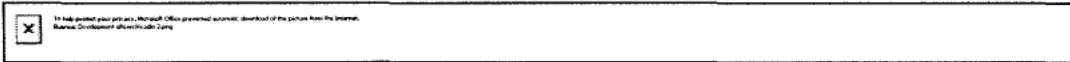

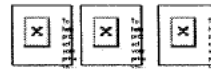

The City of Highland Park is heartbroken by the tragic shooting at the Independence Day Parade on July 4, 2022. As a community, we all share in grieving those who were killed or injured, and our hearts are with their loved ones. Since this unimaginable attack, Highland Park's businesses have stood in solidarity with the victims, survivors, their loved ones, and our community as a whole.

The City understands that the past few days have been especially challenging for business owners and employees, particularly those within the investigation area. While we can all acknowledge that the nature of this incident necessitates a thorough investigation that requires the preservation, as much as possible, of the crime scene, we also know that this has caused additional hardships in addition to the trauma we all experienced just a few days ago. We have prepared the below FAQ to share as much information as we can about this situation, help you to set timeline expectations for your employees, suppliers, and customers, and connect you with resources and assistance to best serve your customers and support your teams.

When can businesses within the investigation perimeter reopen for business?

We know this situation is difficult for our local businesses and we appreciate your patience.

The FBI and Lake County Major Crimes Unit are investigating a major crime. They must be thorough. The area will reopen as soon as we receive clearance from them. They anticipate allowing businesses within the perimeter to access

their place of business by Saturday, July 9 at 6 PM, but this is tentative. Access to your business does not mean you can open for business. As the scene is processed and evaluated, we will provide more information. The City will provide another update to businesses no later than Friday, July 8. The perimeter map follows below.



Why are some businesses within the investigation perimeter operating during the required closure?

Businesses within the perimeter are required to remain closed. Those that were operating have been notified that they must cease operation.

How do healthcare professionals contact their patients to let them know their office is closed until further notice?

While the FBI and Lake County Major Crimes Unit are investigating a major crime, you cannot enter any building within the investigation perimeter. If you cannot access your patient/client list remotely, please consider changing your voicemail message to inform callers that you are closed due to a local emergency and to leave their names and phone numbers so that you can call them back to reschedule. You can also provide an alternate phone number for them to call you or your staff.

How do businesses within the investigation perimeter get their mail during the closure?

Due to the recent events, the Postal service cannot deliver to the closed area due to the ongoing investigation. The Post Office currently has these deliveries on hold at the office. If any business affected by the investigation chooses to pick their mail up at the post office, they can do so during regular business hours. The post office will resume delivery once the authorities allow the Postal service access. Once this occurs, the postal service will deliver any mail currently on hold.

Will businesses within the investigation perimeter receive any government funding to help them recoup lost revenue during the time they are unable to open? Will employees be compensated for lost wages?

No state or federal aid is available at this time. The City is researching opportunities for business assistance.

Are there counseling services available for the community beyond the next few days?

What can businesses do to support those that are working and the Highland Park community? Can we drop off food?

We are truly humbled by the incredible outpouring of support and generosity of

the community.

We urge those who wish to show their financial support to send donations to the Highland Park Community Foundation; a longtime local organization deeply embedded in the community which is in the best position to help our neighbors in need. They have set up a fund to directly assist victims, survivors, and those that support them. Visit hpcf.org to submit donations.

If you or your business are interested in donating food or items to first responders, please contact hr@cityhpil.com with your contact information. We are keeping a list and will reach out should ongoing needs arise.

At this point in time please do not send food directly to any City locations in order to minimize duplicate donations.

Whom do we contact to volunteer to help those in need?

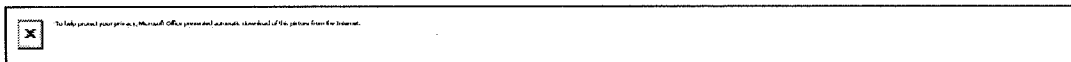
Immediate needs are being met through local, state, and national resources. The Volunteer Pool of Highland Park is maintaining a list of volunteers as a resource should there be a need for volunteers in the future. Individuals interested in having their contact information on file with the Volunteer Pool of Highland Park may email info@volunteerpoolhp.org with their name, contact information, and any specific areas of expertise.

Where should businesses take belongings that were left along the parade route?

Please do not remove personal property left along the parade route as this is still an active investigation. A secure perimeter around the crime scene has been established:



Retrieving items outside the secure perimeter:

Public Works has picked up items left along the parade route outside the secure area and placed them on the north lawn of City Hall, 1707 St. Johns Avenue. Items will be added as they are collected.

Retrieving items within the secure perimeter

Property within the secure area is being processed by the FBI to ensure that all relevant evidence is gathered. Items that are not being retained for evidence will be released as they are processed and may be picked up at the Family Assistance Center at Highland Park High School, 433 Vine Ave, Highland Park

from 9:00 AM through 9:00 PM until Friday. Future dates and hours for item pick-up will be shared as it becomes available.

Items recovered from zones 1 and 5, items from the north side of zone 3, and limited items from zones 4 and 6 on the map below are available for pick-up at this time. There were no personal items recovered in area 2. Items at the intersection of Second and Central are not available for pick-up.



We thank all affected individuals for their patience during this lengthy process as this may take a significant amount of time. Additional information regarding the return of personal effects at the scene will be shared as it becomes available.

What should restaurants within the investigation perimeter do with their spoiled food?

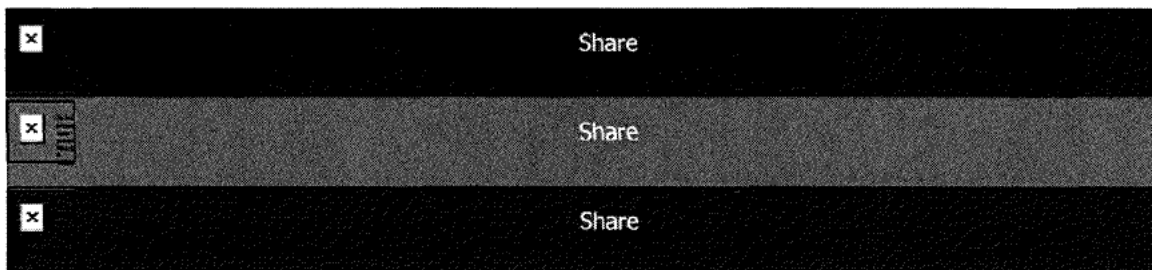
Lakeshore Recycling Systems is prepared to do a pickup of trash and dumpsters the day after businesses regain access to clear any rotting food from the business district. We will work with businesses on any additional assistance needed at that time.

Are there any vigils being organized?

Many compassionate individuals and organizations have organized vigils to honor the memory of those who were killed and offer support and healing in this challenging time. The City is publicizing information about vigils on its website.

What is the status of City-sponsored events?

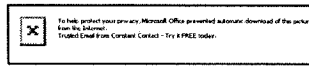

The City of Highland Park is heartbroken by the tragic shooting at the Independence Day Parade on July 4, 2022. As a community, we all share in grieving those who were killed or injured, and our hearts are with their loved ones. Since this unimaginable attack, Highland Park's businesses have stood in solidarity with the victims, survivors, their loved ones, and our community as a whole.

The City understands that the past few days have been especially challenging for business owners and employees, particularly those within the investigation area. While we can all acknowledge that the nature of this incident necessitates a thorough investigation that requires the preservation, as much as possible, of the crime scene, we also know that this has caused additional hardships in addition to the trauma we all experienced just a few days ago. We have prepared the below FAQ to share as much information as we can about this situation, help you to set timeline expectations for your employees, suppliers, and customers, and connect you with resources and assistance to best serve your customers and support your teams.

When can businesses within the investigation perimeter reopen for business?

We know this situation is difficult for our local businesses and we appreciate your patience.

The FBI and Lake County Major Crimes Unit are investigating a major crime. They must be thorough. The area will reopen as soon as we receive clearance from them. They anticipate allowing businesses within the perimeter to access

their place of business by Saturday, July 9 at 6 PM, but this is tentative. Access to your business does not mean you can open for business. As the scene is processed and evaluated, we will provide more information. The City will provide another update to businesses no later than Friday, July 8. The perimeter map follows below.

How do healthcare professionals contact their patients to let them know their office is closed until further notice?

While the FBI and Lake County Major Crimes Unit are investigating a major crime, you cannot enter any building within the investigation perimeter. If you cannot access your patient/client list remotely, please consider changing your voicemail message to inform callers that you are closed due to a local emergency and to leave their names and phone numbers so that you can call them back to reschedule. You can also provide an alternate phone number for them to call you or your staff.

How do businesses within the investigation perimeter get their mail during the closure?

Due to the recent events, the Postal service cannot deliver to the closed area due to the ongoing investigation. The Post Office currently has these deliveries on hold at the office. If any business affected by the investigation chooses to pick their mail up at the post office, they can do so during regular business

hours. The post office will resume delivery once the authorities allow the Postal service access. Once this occurs, the postal service will deliver any mail currently on hold.

Will businesses within the investigation perimeter receive any government funding to help them recoup lost revenue during the time they are unable to open? Will employees be compensated for lost wages?

No state or federal aid is available at this time. The City is researching opportunities for business assistance.

Are there counseling services available for the community beyond the next few days?

What can businesses do to support those that are working and the Highland Park community? Can we drop off food?

We are truly humbled by the incredible outpouring of support and generosity of the community.

At this point in time please do not send food directly to any City locations in order to minimize duplicate donations.

Whom do we contact to volunteer to help those in need?

Immediate needs are being met through local, state, and national resources. The Volunteer Pool of Highland Park is maintaining a list of volunteers as a resource should there be a need for volunteers in the future. Individuals interested in having their contact information on file with the Volunteer Pool of Highland Park may email info@volunteerpoolhp.org with their name, contact information, and any specific areas of expertise.

Organizations with a need for volunteers may reach out to the Volunteer Pool which will assist them in connecting with volunteers.

Where should businesses take belongings that were left along the parade

route?

Please do not remove personal property left along the parade route as this is still an active investigation. A secure perimeter around the crime scene has been established:



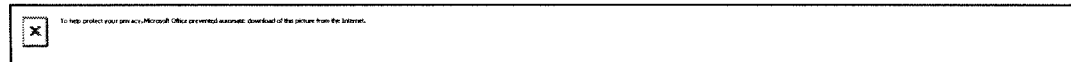
Retrieving items outside the secure perimeter:

Public Works has picked up items left along the parade route outside the secure area and placed them on the north lawn of City Hall, 1707 St. Johns Avenue. Items will be added as they are collected.

Retrieving items within the secure perimeter

Property within the secure area is being processed by the FBI to ensure that all relevant evidence is gathered. Items that are not being retained for evidence will be released as they are processed and may be picked up at the Family Assistance Center at Highland Park High School, 433 Vine Ave, Highland Park from 9:00 AM through 9:00 PM until Friday. Future dates and hours for item pick-up will be shared as it becomes available.

Items recovered from zones 1 and 5, items from the north side of zone 3, and limited items from zones 4 and 6 on the map below are available for pick-up at this time. There were no personal items recovered in area 2. Items at the intersection of Second and Central are not available for pick-up.



We thank all affected individuals for their patience during this lengthy process as this may take a significant amount of time. Additional information regarding the return of personal effects at the scene will be shared as it becomes available.

What should restaurants within the investigation perimeter do with their spoiled food?

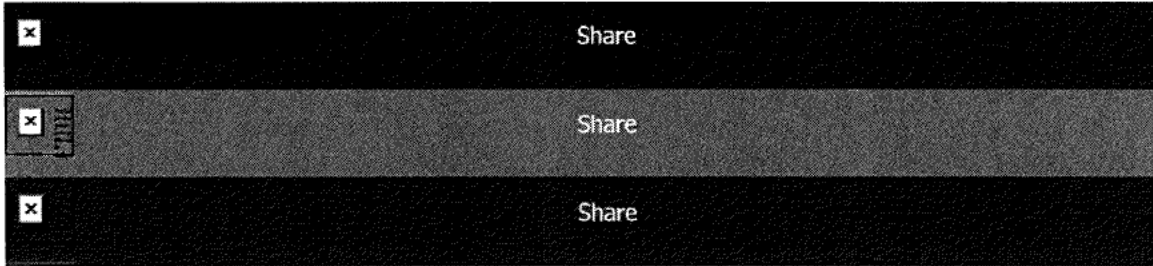
Lakeshore Recycling Systems is prepared to do a pickup of trash and dumpsters the day after businesses regain access to clear any rotting food from the business district. We will work with businesses on any additional assistance needed at that time.

Are there any vigils being organized?

Many compassionate individuals and organizations have organized vigils to honor the memory of those who were killed and offer support and healing in this challenging time. The City is publicizing information about vigils on its website.

What is the status of City-sponsored events?

We have temporarily paused City-sponsored community events for this week and next and anticipate resuming regular programming the week of July 17. We appreciate your understanding as our resources are heavily focused on the investigation. We are not canceling due to fear; we are focusing our resources on the investigation.

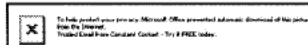

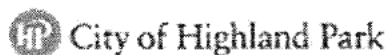

My family and I attended the July 4th parade and were seated/standing at the tree benches by Walker Bros. Original Pancake House at the time of the shooting. My Mother-in-Law [REDACTED] was struck in the leg and treated at Highland Park Hospital (I am sorry, I am from Indianapolis, and may have the incorrect hospital name).

Attached, please find a photo of the shorts I was wearing during the parade. When I made it back to my Brother-in-Law's house [REDACTED] Highland Park, IL 60035), I noticed these odd holes in my shorts. I am unsure if these are caused by the shooting, or by diving on the ground. I have not washed the shorts yet, and could send them to you if they would be at all helpful.

I want to offer my most sincere thanks and love to your fine Police and Fire Department personnel! Firefighter Knicks (sp?) was kind to my young daughters before the parade started, and then miraculously helped my Mother-in-Law after she was injured.

My family is forever in your debt, and are so thankful for your bravery and service!

From my recollection, I was standing roughly within the red circle when the shooting started, and was wearing these khaki shorts, a blue polo shirt, and a gray wide-brim hat.

My family and I were at the parade this morning at the corner of 2nd and Central Avenue. I walked up at about 10:12 AM and took 2 photos of my inlaws and wife and kids watching the parade (photos attached). Not too long after the photos I heard loud gunfire ringing out behind me from the right. I hit the ground and then could hear and feel a bullet ricochet past my right side before getting my family and running into Gearheads. I did not see the shooter, but directionally the sound seemed like it was coming from the rooftop of the Ross Salon.

I know this photo is facing the opposite way towards Walker Brothers but the message I just read on CNN said to send any and all videos/photos that we have to help corroborate evidence. I hope this helps somewhat with the investigation.

Apologize for not sending sooner but we've been helping our kids deal with all of the trauma from today.

Thanks to all of the brave heroes that responded today. My family and I are forever grateful.

Calumet City Disaster Declaration for deadly fire

Calumet City – Today **Governor JB Pritzker** announced that the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has approved a disaster declaration for the Park of River Oaks Condominiums in Calumet City which was devastated by a fire on May 30. This disaster declaration will allow residents, condo homeowners, and businesses to apply for low-interest loans for damages not covered by insurance.

SBA staff will be at the Park of River Oaks starting at 11 a.m. on Friday, July 8 to help residents with their applications. The Disaster Loan Outreach Center will be open weekdays from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. The center closes permanently at 4 p.m. on July 21.

“We requested a disaster declaration on behalf of the 150 families who were left homeless by this devastating fire,” **said Governor JB Pritzker**. “Illinois is very grateful to the SBA because it will help these families rebuild their lives. Some of these residents lost not just the structure of their home, but everything they owned. I encourage every resident affected by the fire to apply for one of these loans.”

One woman died in the fire and seven others, including three firefighters, were injured.

“I want to commend Calumet City Mayor Thaddeus Jones for his quick and sincere work to pull together his administration, local businesses, and the Red Cross to help the residents find shelter. These families needed a strong leader, and they had one in Mayor Jones,” **said Governor JB Pritzker**.

“It is vital that our residents have access to the resources they need during times of crisis,” **said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle**. “I am grateful to Gov. Pritzker for his leadership and advocacy on behalf of the 150 impacted families and thank the Cook County Department of Emergency Management and Regional

Security for their efforts to conduct damage assessments and coordinate assistance for Calumet City residents devastated by this fire.”

“We are grateful to Gov. Pritzker and his administration for their continued efforts in assisting the Park Condominium residents who have been traumatized by this fire,” **said Calumet City Mayor Thaddeus Jones**. “The availability of loans will give the residents yet another option to consider in their collective roads to recovery. The leadership of Gov. Pritzker and other statewide agencies has been nothing short of stellar. Their involvement, along with my administration, our first responders, and local aldermen have been of great relief and assistance to the Park Condominium residents.”

Homeowners can apply for up to \$200,000 in low-interest loans to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate. Homeowners or renters can apply for up to \$40,000 to repair or replace damaged or destroyed personal property. Businesses and not-for-profits can borrow up to \$2 million for physical damages. This declaration covers Cook County and the adjacent counties of DuPage, Kane, Lake, Henry, and Will counties in Illinois, plus Lake County, Indiana. Calumet City Disaster Declaration for deadly fire

Calumet City – Today **Governor JB Pritzker** announced that the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has approved a disaster declaration for the Park of River Oaks Condominiums in Calumet City which was devastated by a fire on May 30. This disaster declaration will allow residents, condo homeowners, and businesses to apply for low-interest loans for damages not covered by insurance.

SBA staff will be at the Park of River Oaks starting at 11 a.m. on Friday, July 8 to help residents with their applications. The Disaster Loan Outreach Center will be open weekdays from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. The center closes permanently at 4 p.m. on July 21.

“We requested a disaster declaration on behalf of the 150 families who were left homeless by this devastating fire,” **said Governor JB Pritzker**. “Illinois is very grateful to the SBA because it will help these families rebuild their lives. Some of these residents lost not just the structure of their home, but everything they owned. I encourage every resident affected by the fire to apply for one of these loans.”

One woman died in the fire and seven others, including three firefighters, were injured.

“I want to commend Calumet City Mayor Thaddeus Jones for his quick and sincere work to pull together his administration, local businesses, and the Red Cross to help the residents find shelter. These families needed a strong leader, and they had one in Mayor Jones,” **said Governor JB Pritzker**.

“It is vital that our residents have access to the resources they need during times of crisis,” **said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle**. “I am grateful to Gov. Pritzker for his leadership and advocacy on behalf of the 150 impacted families and thank the Cook County Department of Emergency Management and Regional

Security for their efforts to conduct damage assessments and coordinate assistance for Calumet City residents devastated by this fire.”

“We are grateful to Gov. Pritzker and his administration for their continued efforts in assisting the Park Condominium residents who have been traumatized by this fire,” **said Calumet City Mayor Thaddeus Jones**. “The availability of loans will give the residents yet another option to consider in their collective roads to recovery. The leadership of Gov. Pritzker and other statewide agencies has been nothing short of stellar. Their involvement, along with my administration, our first responders, and local aldermen have been of great relief and assistance to the Park Condominium residents.”

Homeowners can apply for up to \$200,000 in low-interest loans to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate. Homeowners or renters can apply for up to \$40,000 to repair or replace damaged or destroyed personal property. Businesses and not-for-profits can borrow up to \$2 million for physical damages. This declaration covers Cook County and the adjacent counties of DuPage, Kane, Lake, Henry, and Will counties in Illinois, plus Lake County, Indiana. 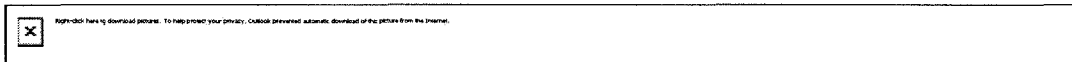

Please do not remove personal property left along the parade route as this is still an active investigation. A secure perimeter around the crime scene has been established:



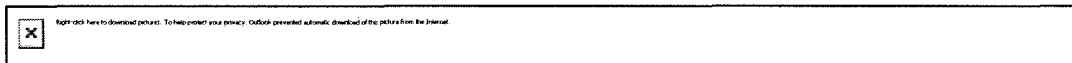
Retrieving items outside the secure perimeter:

Property within the secure area is being processed by the FBI to ensure that all relevant evidence is gathered. Items that are not being retained for evidence will be released as they are processed and may be picked up at the Family Assistance Center at Highland Park High School, 433 Vine Ave, Highland Park from 9:00 AM through 9:00 PM until Friday. Future dates and hours for item pick-up will be shared as it becomes available.

Items recovered from zones 1 and 5, items from the north side of zone 3, and limited items from zones 4 and 6 on the map below are available for pick-up at this time. There were no personal items recovered in area 2. Items at the intersection of Second and Central are not available for pick-up.

Calumet City Disaster Declaration for deadly fire

Calumet City – Today **Governor JB Pritzker** announced that the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has approved a disaster declaration for the Park of River Oaks Condominiums in Calumet City which was devastated by a fire on May 30. This disaster declaration will allow residents, condo homeowners, and businesses to apply for low-interest loans for damages not covered by insurance.

SBA staff will be at the Park of River Oaks starting at 11 a.m. on Friday, July 8 to help residents with their applications. The Disaster Loan Outreach Center will be open weekdays from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. The center closes permanently at 4 p.m. on July 21.

“We requested a disaster declaration on behalf of the 150 families who were left homeless by this devastating fire,” **said Governor JB Pritzker**. “Illinois is very grateful to the SBA because it will help these families rebuild their lives. Some of these residents lost not just the structure of their home, but everything they owned. I encourage every resident affected by the fire to apply for one of these loans.”

One woman died in the fire and seven others, including three firefighters, were injured.

“I want to commend Calumet City Mayor Thaddeus Jones for his quick and sincere work to pull together his administration, local businesses, and the Red Cross to help the residents find shelter. These families needed a strong leader, and they had one in Mayor Jones,” **said Governor JB Pritzker**.

“It is vital that our residents have access to the resources they need during times of crisis,” **said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle**. “I am grateful to Gov. Pritzker for his leadership and advocacy on behalf of the 150 impacted families and thank the Cook County Department of Emergency Management and Regional

Security for their efforts to conduct damage assessments and coordinate assistance for Calumet City residents devastated by this fire.”

“We are grateful to Gov. Pritzker and his administration for their continued efforts in assisting the Park Condominium residents who have been traumatized by this fire,” **said Calumet City Mayor Thaddeus Jones**. “The availability of loans will give the residents yet another option to consider in their collective roads to recovery. The leadership of Gov. Pritzker and other statewide agencies has been nothing short of stellar. Their involvement, along with my administration, our first responders, and local aldermen have been of great relief and assistance to the Park Condominium residents.”

Homeowners can apply for up to \$200,000 in low-interest loans to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate. Homeowners or renters can apply for up to \$40,000 to repair or replace damaged or destroyed personal property. Businesses and not-for-profits can borrow up to \$2 million for physical damages. This declaration covers Cook County and the adjacent counties of DuPage, Kane, Lake, Henry, and Will counties in Illinois, plus Lake County, Indiana. Calumet City Disaster Declaration for deadly fire

Calumet City – Today **Governor JB Pritzker** announced that the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has approved a disaster declaration for the Park of River Oaks Condominiums in Calumet City which was devastated by a fire on May 30. This disaster declaration will allow residents, condo homeowners, and businesses to apply for low-interest loans for damages not covered by insurance.

SBA staff will be at the Park of River Oaks starting at 11 a.m. on Friday, July 8 to help residents with their applications. The Disaster Loan Outreach Center will be open weekdays from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. The center closes permanently at 4 p.m. on July 21.

“We requested a disaster declaration on behalf of the 150 families who were left homeless by this devastating fire,” **said Governor JB Pritzker**. “Illinois is very grateful to the SBA because it will help these families rebuild their lives. Some of these residents lost not just the structure of their home, but everything they owned. I encourage every resident affected by the fire to apply for one of these loans.”

One woman died in the fire and seven others, including three firefighters, were injured.

“I want to commend Calumet City Mayor Thaddeus Jones for his quick and sincere work to pull together his administration, local businesses, and the Red Cross to help the residents find shelter. These families needed a strong leader, and they had one in Mayor Jones,” **said Governor JB Pritzker**.

“It is vital that our residents have access to the resources they need during times of crisis,” **said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle**. “I am grateful to Gov. Pritzker for his leadership and advocacy on behalf of the 150 impacted families and thank the Cook County Department of Emergency Management and Regional

Security for their efforts to conduct damage assessments and coordinate assistance for Calumet City residents devastated by this fire.”

“We are grateful to Gov. Pritzker and his administration for their continued efforts in assisting the Park Condominium residents who have been traumatized by this fire,” said **Calumet City Mayor Thaddeus Jones**. “The availability of loans will give the residents yet another option to consider in their collective roads to recovery. The leadership of Gov. Pritzker and other statewide agencies has been nothing short of stellar. Their involvement, along with my administration, our first responders, and local aldermen have been of great relief and assistance to the Park Condominium residents.”

Homeowners can apply for up to \$200,000 in low-interest loans to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate. Homeowners or renters can apply for up to \$40,000 to repair or replace damaged or destroyed personal property. Businesses and not-for-profits can borrow up to \$2 million for physical damages. Details on loans are available at <https://disasterloanassistance.sba.gov/ela/s/>.

This declaration covers Cook County and the adjacent counties of DuPage, Kane, Lake, Henry, and Will counties in Illinois, plus Lake County, Indiana. 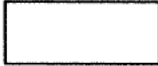

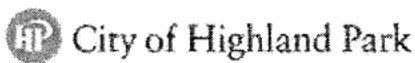

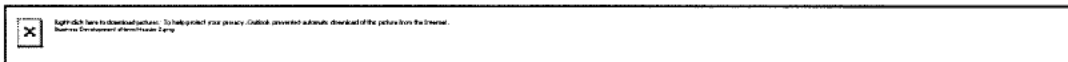

The City of Highland Park is heartbroken by the tragic shooting at the Independence Day Parade on July 4, 2022. As a community, we all share in grieving those who were killed or injured, and our hearts are with their loved ones. Since this unimaginable attack, Highland Park's businesses have stood in solidarity with the victims, survivors, their loved ones, and our community as a whole.

The City understands that the past few days have been especially challenging for business owners and employees, particularly those within the investigation area. While we can all acknowledge that the nature of this incident necessitates a thorough investigation that requires the preservation, as much as possible, of the crime scene, we also know that this has caused additional hardships in addition to the trauma we all experienced just a few days ago. We have prepared the below FAQ to share as much information as we can about this situation, help you to set timeline expectations for your employees, suppliers, and customers, and connect you with resources and assistance to best serve your customers and support your teams.

When can businesses within the investigation perimeter reopen for business?

We know this situation is difficult for our local businesses and we appreciate your patience.

The FBI and Lake County Major Crimes Unit are investigating a major crime. They must be thorough. The area will reopen as soon as we receive clearance from them. They anticipate allowing businesses within the perimeter to access their place of business by Saturday, July 9 at 6 PM, but this is tentative. Access to your business does not mean you can open for business. As the scene is processed and evaluated, we will provide more information. The City will provide another update to businesses no later than Friday, July 8. The perimeter map follows below.



Why are some businesses within the investigation perimeter operating during the required closure?

Businesses within the perimeter are required to remain closed. Those that were operating have been notified that they must cease operation.

How do healthcare professionals contact their patients to let them know their office is closed until further notice?

While the FBI and Lake County Major Crimes Unit are investigating a major

crime, you cannot enter any building within the investigation perimeter. If you cannot access your patient/client list remotely, please consider changing your voicemail message to inform callers that you are closed due to a local emergency and to leave their names and phone numbers so that you can call them back to reschedule. You can also provide an alternate phone number for them to call you or your staff.

How do businesses within the investigation perimeter get their mail during the closure?

Due to the recent events, the Postal service cannot deliver to the closed area due to the ongoing investigation. The Post Office currently has these deliveries on hold at the office. If any business affected by the investigation chooses to pick their mail up at the post office, they can do so during regular business hours. The post office will resume delivery once the authorities allow the Postal service access. Once this occurs, the postal service will deliver any mail currently on hold.

Will businesses within the investigation perimeter receive any government funding to help them recoup lost revenue during the time they are unable to open? Will employees be compensated for lost wages?

No state or federal aid is available at this time. The City is researching opportunities for business assistance.

Are there counseling services available for the community beyond the next few days?

What can businesses do to support those that are working and the Highland Park community? Can we drop off food?

We are truly humbled by the incredible outpouring of support and generosity of the community.

We urge those who wish to show their financial support to send donations to the Highland Park Community Foundation; a longtime local organization deeply embedded in the community which is in the best position to help our neighbors in need. They have set up a fund to directly assist victims, survivors, and those that support them. Visit hpcf.org to submit donations.

If you or your business are interested in donating food or items to first responders, please contact hr@cityhpil.com with your contact information. We are keeping a list and will reach out should ongoing needs arise.

At this point in time please do not send food directly to any City locations in order to minimize duplicate donations.

Whom do we contact to volunteer to help those in need?

Immediate needs are being met through local, state, and national resources.

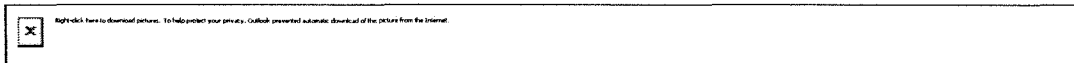

Where should businesses take belongings that were left along the parade route?

Please do not remove personal property left along the parade route as this is still an active investigation. A secure perimeter around the crime scene has been established:



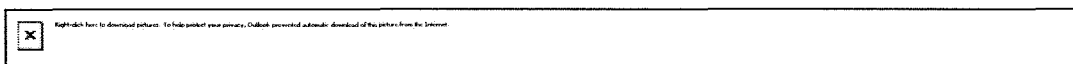
Retrieving items outside the secure perimeter:

Public Works has picked up items left along the parade route outside the secure area and placed them on the north lawn of City Hall, 1707 St. Johns Avenue. Items will be added as they are collected.

Retrieving items within the secure perimeter

Property within the secure area is being processed by the FBI to ensure that all relevant evidence is gathered. Items that are not being retained for evidence will be released as they are processed and may be picked up at the Family Assistance Center at Highland Park High School, 433 Vine Ave, Highland Park from 9:00 AM through 9:00 PM until Friday. Future dates and hours for item pick-up will be shared as it becomes available.

Items recovered from zones 1 and 5, items from the north side of zone 3, and limited items from zones 4 and 6 on the map below are available for pick-up at this time. There were no personal items recovered in area 2. Items at the intersection of Second and Central are not available for pick-up.



We thank all affected individuals for their patience during this lengthy process as this may take a significant amount of time. Additional information regarding

the return of personal effects at the scene will be shared as it becomes available.

What should restaurants within the investigation perimeter do with their spoiled food?

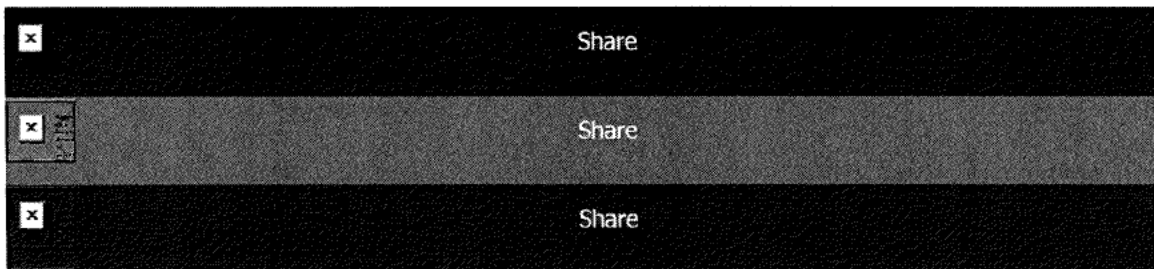

We have temporarily paused City-sponsored community events for this week and next and anticipate resuming regular programming the week of July 17. We appreciate your understanding as our resources are heavily focused on the investigation. We are not canceling due to fear; we are focusing our resources on the investigation.

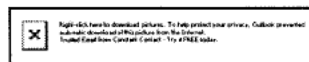

Calumet City Disaster Declaration for deadly fire

Calumet City – Today **Governor JB Pritzker** announced that the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has approved a disaster declaration for the Park of River Oaks Condominiums in Calumet City which was devastated by a fire on May 30. This disaster declaration will allow residents, condo homeowners, and businesses to apply for low-interest loans for damages not covered by insurance.

SBA staff will be at the Park of River Oaks starting at 11 a.m. on Friday, July 8 to help residents with their applications. The Disaster Loan Outreach Center will be open weekdays from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. The center closes permanently at 4 p.m. on July 21.

“We requested a disaster declaration on behalf of the 150 families who were left homeless by this devastating fire,” **said Governor JB Pritzker**. “Illinois is very grateful to the SBA because it will help these families rebuild their lives. Some of these residents lost not just the structure of their home, but everything they owned. I encourage every resident affected by the fire to apply for one of these loans.”

One woman died in the fire and seven others, including three firefighters, were injured.

“I want to commend Calumet City Mayor Thaddeus Jones for his quick and sincere work to pull together his administration, local businesses, and the Red Cross to help the residents find shelter. These families needed a strong leader, and they had one in Mayor Jones,” **said Governor JB Pritzker**.

“It is vital that our residents have access to the resources they need during times of crisis,” **said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle**. “I am grateful to Gov. Pritzker for his leadership and advocacy on behalf of the 150 impacted families and thank the Cook County Department of Emergency Management and Regional

Security for their efforts to conduct damage assessments and coordinate assistance for Calumet City residents devastated by this fire.”

“We are grateful to Gov. Pritzker and his administration for their continued efforts in assisting the Park Condominium residents who have been traumatized by this fire,” **said Calumet City Mayor Thaddeus Jones**. “The availability of loans will give the residents yet another option to consider in their collective roads to recovery. The leadership of Gov. Pritzker and other statewide agencies has been nothing short of stellar. Their involvement, along with my administration, our first responders, and local aldermen have been of great relief and assistance to the Park Condominium residents.”

Homeowners can apply for up to \$200,000 in low-interest loans to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate. Homeowners or renters can apply for up to \$40,000 to repair or replace damaged or destroyed personal property. Businesses and not-for-profits can borrow up to \$2 million for physical damages. Details on loans are available at <https://disasterloanassistance.sba.gov/ela/s/>.

This declaration covers Cook County and the adjacent counties of DuPage, Kane, Lake, Henry, and Will counties in Illinois, plus Lake County, Indiana. TESTING AND TREATMENT

FDA Authorizes Pharmacists to Prescribe Paxlovid with Certain Limitations: The U.S. Food and Drug Administration revised the [Emergency Use Authorization](#) (EUA) for Paxlovid (nirmatrelvir and ritonavir), to authorize state-licensed pharmacists to prescribe Paxlovid to eligible patients, with certain limitations to ensure appropriate patient assessment and prescribing of Paxlovid. The Director for the FDA's Center for Drug Evaluation and Research, Dr. Patrizia Cavazzoni, stated that, "[t]he FDA recognizes the important role pharmacists have played and continue to play in combatting this pandemic. Since Paxlovid must be taken within five days after symptoms begin, authorizing state-licensed pharmacists to prescribe Paxlovid could expand access to timely treatment for some patients who are eligible to receive this drug for the treatment of COVID-19."

Patients who have tested positive for COVID-19 and are seeking to determine their eligibility for receiving Paxlovid at locations where prescribing by state-licensed pharmacists is available should bring the following information to ensure that the state-licensed pharmacist has sufficient information to determine their eligibility to receive Paxlovid:

- Electronic or printed health records less than 12 months old, including the most recent reports of laboratory blood work for the state-licensed pharmacist to review for kidney or liver problems. State-licensed pharmacists could also receive this information through a consult with the patient's health care provider.
- A list of all medications they are taking, including over-the-counter medications so the state-licensed pharmacist can screen for drugs with potentially serious interactions with

Factors Associated with Severe Outcomes Among Immunocompromised Adults Hospitalized for COVID-19: CDC published an MMWR on factors associated with severe outcomes among immunocompromised adults hospitalized for COVID-19 in ten states from March 2020 to February 2022. Immunocompromise is associated with increased risk for intensive care unit (ICU) admission and in-hospital death after SARS-CoV-2 infection. Population-based descriptions of immunocompromised hospitalized patients and their outcomes are limited. Immunocompromised patients accounted for 12.2% of all adult COVID-19 hospitalizations among 10 states and had increased odds of ICU admission and in-hospital death compared with nonimmunocompromised patients, irrespective of vaccination status. Known multilayered prevention measures, including nonpharmaceutical interventions, up-to-date COVID-19 vaccination, and therapeutics, can prevent hospitalization and subsequent severe COVID-19 outcomes among immunocompromised persons.

COVID-19 was third leading cause of death in the United States in both 2020 and 2021: NIH published a media advisory on an analysis that COVID-19 was the third leading cause of death in the United States between March 2020 and October 2021. During the 20-month period studied, COVID-19 accounted for 1 in 8 deaths (or 350,000 deaths) in the United States. Heart disease was the number one cause of death, followed by cancer, with these two causes of death accounting for a total of 1.29 million deaths. Accidents and stroke were the fourth and fifth leading causes of death. In every age group 15 years and older, COVID-19 was one of the top five causes of death during this period. When the authors analyzed deaths in 2020 (March–December) and in 2021 (January–October) separately, they found that in 2020, COVID-19 was the fourth and fifth leading cause of death among people ages 45–54 and 35–44, respectively. But in 2021, COVID-19 became the first and second leading cause of death in these age groups. Among those 85 and older, COVID-19 was the second leading cause of death in 2020, but dropped to third in 2021, likely because of targeted vaccination efforts in this age group.

Small NIH study reveals how immune response triggered by COVID-19 may damage the brain: NIH published a news release on how immune response triggered by COVID-19 may damage the brain. A study from the National Institutes of Health describes the immune response triggered by COVID-19 infection that damages the brain's blood vessels and may lead to short- and long-term neurological symptoms. In a study published in *Brain*, researchers from the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke (NINDS) examined brain changes in nine people who died suddenly after contracting the virus. The scientists found evidence that antibodies—proteins produced by the immune system in response to viruses and other invaders—are involved in an attack on the cells lining the brain's blood vessels, leading to inflammation and damage. Consistent with an earlier study from the group, SARS-CoV-2 was not detected in the patients' brains, suggesting the virus was not infecting the brain directly. Understanding how SARS-CoV-2

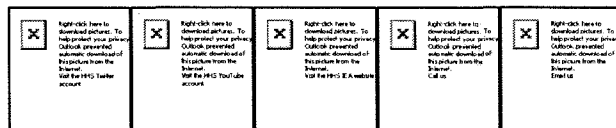
can trigger brain damage may help inform development of therapies for COVID-19 patients who have lingering neurological symptoms.

Q&A: COVID-19, Vaccines, and Myocarditis: NIH published a story on [benefits of COVID-19 vaccines outweighing a very small risk of heart complication](#). Dr. Jerome Fleg, a program officer with the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI) Division of Cardiovascular Sciences, oversees and conducts research on heart disease shared that the benefits of getting vaccinated markedly outweigh the very small risk of vaccine-related myocarditis. Vaccination prevents most hospitalizations and deaths due to COVID-19. It's clear that vaccination can protect individuals from myocarditis by protecting individuals from COVID-19 infection. Myocarditis is a rare complication of COVID-19 vaccination. It affects fewer than 20 people per 1,000,000 COVID-19 vaccinations. Only the mRNA vaccines (Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna) have been linked with myocarditis. Myocarditis related to COVID-19 vaccines seems to be caused by the body's immune response to vaccination. Most people (95%) who develop myocarditis after receiving a COVID-19 mRNA vaccine have only mild symptoms that go away within a few days. Vaccine-linked myocarditis is less likely to cause lingering heart problems than myocarditis due to COVID-19 illness. Only about 1 out of 100 cases of heart inflammation linked with COVID-19 vaccines is life-threatening. An analysis of 627 cases of vaccine-linked myocarditis worldwide showed that 626 fully recovered — and one fatality.

What's New in 2022 in Illinois' Mental Health Crisis System

590 MOBILE CRISIS TEAMS

Mobile crisis teams provide 24/7/365 timely in-person response to people in a mental health crisis. They can do assessments and help stabilize a person at their home or wherever they are located. They can also connect people to treatment and community resources.

Illinois started the 590 grant program in late 2021 to fund new mobile crisis team programs at 68 organizations across the state. These programs dispatch "590 teams," which should include both a mental health clinician and a peer "engagement specialist."

Q: What kinds of crises can a 590 team handle?

A: Currently, each 590-funded program operates by their own guidelines about what kinds of crises they will respond to versus what they'll refer to 911 or a community provider.

Q: Will 590 teams serve everyone and anyone?

A: 590 teams must serve people with all insurance statuses, including Medicaid, private insurance and no insurance. Some 590 teams have age restrictions on who they will serve.

Q: How does someone access or deploy a 590 team in their area?

A: Currently, each 590-funded program has their own dispatch number. Someday, Illinoisians may be able to call 988 to centrally access 590 teams, but that won't be built out when 988 launches. One Hope United dispatch numbers: **Lake County: 630.866.1711**

Q: How are 590 teams different than other mental health mobile crisis teams?

A: Their services aren't categorically different than other mobile crisis teams. They do receive some training and oversight from the State that other mobile crisis teams do not. 590 teams may have a special coordination relationship with 911 after the implementation of CESSA.

CESSA: Community Emergency Services And Support Act

CESSA is a 2021 law to help organize the way mental health crisis services work in Illinois.

Q: What does the law require?

A: Each of Illinois' 11 emergency services regions must create rules for responding to mental health crises. The rules will dictate what kinds of crises will receive a law enforcement or EMT response versus a response by a mental health professional.

Q: How will the work be done?

A: Illinois must convene a Statewide Advisory Committee and 11 Regional Committees by 2023. Committees include EMS leadership, law enforcement, 911, unions, mental health providers, and people with lived experience. These committees will make the rules for each region.

3. Notice of the Right to Review by Illinois Attorney General

4. Notice of Right to Judicial Review

5. Justification for Denial

I won't give the name, but [REDACTED] is so traumatized that he needed to talk even though I was just calling him for a medication refill for my dog Percy.

Next, [REDACTED] at every year for the July 4th parade but decided not to this year is beside herself with guilt and grief that she wasn't there. I told her that she isn't alone --I too wasn't there and that we can all be supportive of one another. Again, this is not CERT related, but after working with the developmentally delayed population and now the autism population, I have had many years of experience with crisis prevention intervention.

Meanwhile, I will be prepared to put the CERT activation hours onto the excel document when ready.

Victims are not just those who are physically injured, but also those who were present and may be experiencing emotional distress. All affected individuals and families should feel safe accessing services at the FAC, regardless of immigration status.

- Friday, June 8: 9 AM - 9 PM
- Saturday, June 9: TBD

Note: The entrance to receive services at Highland Park High School has moved from the main entrance on Vine Street to the H-Entrance. The H-Entrance is on the north side of the school, near St. Johns Avenue and

Woodpath Lane. Only the H-Entrance will be open. All visitors will check in at the H-Entrance and per school standard operating procedures, anyone who is not a current District 113 student or staff member who wishes to take advantage of counseling services will need to provide a valid form of identification to be cleared to enter the school.

Property within the secure area is being processed by the FBI to ensure that all relevant evidence is gathered. Items that are not being retained for evidence will be released as they are processed and may be picked up at the Family Assistance Center at Highland Park High School, 433 Vine Ave, Highland Park from 9:00 AM through 9:00 PM until Friday. Future dates and hours for item pick-up will be shared as it becomes available.

Items recovered from zones 1 and 5, items from the north side of zone 3, and limited items from zones 4 and 6 on the map below are available for pick-up at this time. There were no personal items recovered in area 2. Items at the intersection of Second and Central are not available for pick-up.

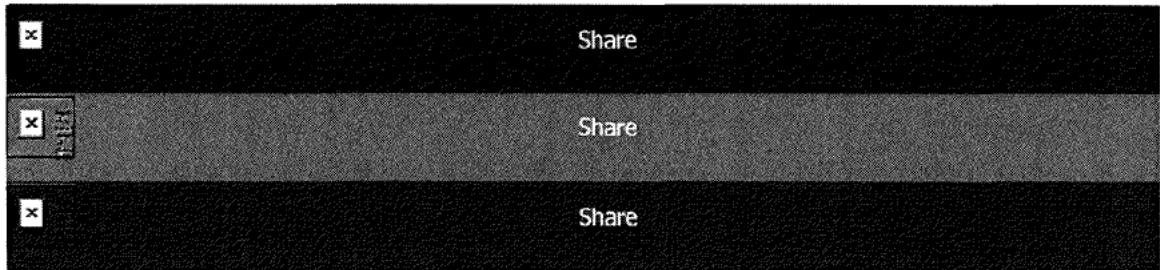

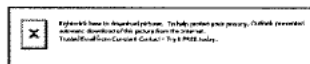

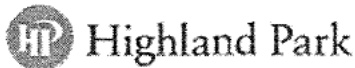
